Goal – Healthy and well-nourished citizens

- Incidences of hunger and malnutrition would have been reduced by at least 80% and hunger by at least 30% with an accent on women
- The beginnings of transformed African economies which provide the resources and the medium for eliminating poverty and hunger......
- ➤ Basic necessities of life-safe drinking water and sanitation will be available to nine out of ten persons



Africa Health Strategy (2016-2030)

Strategic focus-

- Scaling up efforts to end hunger and malnutrition
- >Addressing non-communicable diseases

Strategic Objective-

Reducing all forms of malnutrition including stunting among children and related nutrition objectives as specified in the Africa Regional Nutrition Strategy(2016-2025)



Africa Regional Nutrition Strategy ARNS (2015-2025)

Guiding Principles:

- a) It is the responsibility of each AU member state to fulfill their obligations towards realization of the right to nutrition security for all their citizens
- b) It is the role of the AU, its institutions and partner agencies to provide advocacy, guidance and support to the efforts of AU member states
- c) AU to use its well established mechanisms to put in place accountability frameworks which are tailored towards nutrition in order to strengthen nutrition governance

Objectives:

- 1. 40% reduction of the number of African children under 5 years who are stunted by 2025;
- 2. 50% reduction of anemia in women of child-bearing age in Africa by 2025;
- 3. 30% reduction of low birth weight in Africa by 2025;
- 4. No increase of overweight in African children under 5 years of age by 2025;
- 5. Increase exclusive breast-feeding rates during the first six months in Africa to at least 50% by 2025;
- 6. Reduce and maintain childhood wasting in Africa to less than 5% by 2025.



Advocacy-for nutrition specific /sensitive interventions

To include-

- 1. Nutrition sensitive agriculture-Transformation of agriculture in Africa to provide both food and nutrition security, in order to improve both the quantity and quality of foods produced
- 2. Nutrition sensitive social protection-
- 3. Nutrition sensitive water and sanitation-e.g increased hand washing with soap and control of open defecation
- 4. Nutrition Sensitive Education-Increased knowledge and understanding of nutrition among young 'parents-to-be and improving the nutritional status of adolescent girls, including actions to address obesity and related NCD's
- 5. Nutrition Sensitive Trade and Industry-aiming to make food production and marketing play a key role in providing more nutritious food for consumers
- 6.Community-based nutrition Approaches-that foster community engagement and ownership of nutrition sensitive and specific interventions
- 7. Nutrition specific and sensitive multi-sectorial approaches-The strengthening of nutrition governance to create an 'enabling environment'



Initiatives and platforms

Initiatives-

- □2014-Appointment of an African Nutrition Champion- (His Majesty King Letsie III) mandated extended in 2017/2019 **Assembly/AU/Dec.621(XXVIII**
- □AUC embarked on generating evidence around the enormity of the malnutrition problem in Africa (Cost Hunger in Africa) COHA study **Assembly/AU//Decl.4(XXIII)** 21 countries have completed the study so far.
- □ARISE-2025-AUC led continental campaign towards the Elimination of Child Under nutrition in Africa: to reduce stunting by 10% and malnutrition by 5% by 2025
- □ Africa Leaders for Nutrition Initiative-Co led with the Africa Development Bank endorsed in 2018 Assembly/AU/Dec.681(XXX) . Further the Continental Accountability Scorecard for Nutrition was launched in 2019

Platforms-

- □African Task Force on Food and Nutrition Development (ATFFND) established 1987 meets yearly
- □30 October of each year as "Africa's Day for Food and Nutrition Security"
- 1 March each year African Day of School Feeding
